Financing:

Most often the cost of doing P.1. service work is met from group contributions to whatever body forms the committee-general service area, district, central office/intergroup or, in smaller communities, one or more A.A. groups.

Usually, funds for the committee's work will be included in the budget of the A.A. entity served, and P.I. expenses are regularly reported. Occasionally, there is consideration of a special allocation for P.1. projects, such as distributing Big Books to local libraries.
