

Service work within District 12, the community we live in, is a significant part of carrying the message. Before us, many more than we are carried on the tradition of Service Work in and out of the District to reach the still sick and suffering alcoholic. As we've grown into reliable sober individuals, we have found a means to work with others who are like minded in the approach of working together to reach a greater number of people, not just an occasional newcomer - who we may adopt as our conscience guides us.

Those involved in the Service Work of the District still have time and inclination to work with individual alcoholics through sponsorship. However, reaching out to the ones we have not seen 'come in', and their families or friends, who are also, maybe more so, interested in the program is another thing entirely.

From Dr. Bob's Farewell Talk July 30, 1950

"There are two or three things that flashed into my mind on which it would be fitting to lay a little emphasis. One is the simplicity of our program. Let's not louse it all up with Freudian complexes and things that are interesting to the scientific mind, but have very little to do with our actual A.A. work. Our Twelve Steps, when simmered down to the last, resolve themselves into the words "love" and "service." We understand what love is, and we understand what service is. So let's bear those two things in mind.

"Let us also remember to guard that erring member the tongue, and if we must use it, let's use it with kindness and consideration and tolerance.

"And one more thing: None of us would be here today if somebody hadn't taken time to explain things to us, to give us a little pat on the back, to take us to a meeting or two, to do numerous little kind and thoughtful acts in our behalf. So let us never get such a degree of smug complacency that we're not willing to extend, or attempt to extend, to our less fortunate brothers that help which has been so beneficial to us." ²

"Let's not louse it all up..." A very apt statement as to our mindset in A.A. All that we have is a daily reprieve from "King Alcohol".

Dr. Bob above gives us what the spiritual awakening in Step 12 refers to – love and service. (That psychic change of personality). And then he tells some parts of what practicing these principles in all our affairs is – "guard that erring member the tongue," and also, "So let us never get such a degree of smug complacency that we're not willing to extend, or attempt to extend, to our less fortunate brothers that help which has been so beneficial to us."

Twelfth Step: "Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs." ^{2 ibid}

Twelfth Tradition: "Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all of our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities." ⁴

"The Twelfth Concept of World Service, in its short form, states as follows:

'The Conference shall observe the spirit of AA. tradition, taking care that it never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds and reserve be its prudent financial principle; that it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others; that it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy; that it never perform acts of government, and that, like the Society it serves, it will always remain democratic in thought and action.'

"In its long form, the Twelfth Concept is actually Article 12 of the Conference Charter. It is considered so important that it can be changed only by written consent of three-quarters vote of the directory-listed AA groups, and then only after six months has been allowed for deliberation." ⁵

At first look, the common theme among the Twelfth Step, Tradition, and Concept is 'principle'. Now we know that principles are ideals to strive towards. So we practice them always, place them before personality (mostly our own), and observe prudence in finances. What is paramount is that the Conference observes the 'spirit of A.A. tradition' through its decisions, votes, and adherence to avoid controversy with anonymity in democracy.

In the book Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age, a brief history of A.A., June 1, 1957, Bill W. and Dr. Bob struggled with the thought of creating an A.A. World Service Conference in which the work of A.A. would pass from their hands to the Conference. There was talk of the old order changing and the need for approval from these two stalwarts to make it happen.

"If thereafter the Headquarters should collapse for lack of Conference linkage, the A.A.'s could rightfully say, 'Why didn't Dr. Bob and Bill tell us? Why didn't they give us a chance to look after our own business and policy?' I ventured the idea that we ought to call the Conference anyhow, even if it was a failure at first...

"He continued to reflect, and I waited. Finally he looked up and said, 'Bill, it *has* to be A.A.'s decision, not ours. Let's call that Conference. Its fine with me.' ... That would make it a movement decision, rather than one taken in silence by Dr. Bob and me.

"A few hours later I took my leave of Dr. Bob, knowing that the following week he was to undergo a very serious operation. Neither of us dared say what was in our hearts. We both knew that this might well be the last decision that we would ever make together. I went down the steps and then turned to look back. Bob stood in the doorway, tall and upright as ever. Some color had come back to his cheeks. And he was carefully dressed in a gray suit. This was my partner, the man with whom I never had a hard word. The wonderful, old, broad smile was on his face as he said almost jokingly, 'Remember, Bill, let's not louse this thing up. Let's keep it simple!' " ⁴



The second definition above may be what Dr. Bob was referring to. To perform the task incompletely, and not leave it in the capable hands of others was what he and Bill W. struggled with. Their combined perception that it must carry on, and that it could, and would without them, if only they would get out of the way, was an unselfish act of Service. Sounds reminiscent of the phrase from the Big Book, "That God could and would if He were sought." ⁵

. They recognized that no gain is likely without a risk of failure, but also had the sense of the situation that it was in good hands at Headquarters with Trustees already in place. Their faith in the Fellowship allowed them to make the hard decision to step aside, and let others of need, want, and experience carry the message of A.A. recovery

From these thoughts in 1950, "This Conference Charter was drawn up and unanimously adopted by the 1955 Conference. It has been updated by the 1968, 1969, 1970, 1971, 1974, 1975, 1978, 1979, 1986 and 1988 Conferences" ⁶ as per Comes of Age's Thirty-Third Printing in 2007.

A.A. Service Work is so important that the World Service Conference is continually looking at it and updating it through the Charter for the times in which it is lived. That's experience, strength, and hope!

"Each A.A. group has but one primary purpose-to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.


Every A.A. group ought to be self-supporting. Alcoholics Anonymous should forever remain nonprofessional.

A.A. as such ought never be organized, but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.

Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern.

We try to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

Note: The traditional principles of A.A. service stated above have been amplified by Bill W. and made a part of The A.A. Service Manual and Twelve Concepts for World Service." ⁸

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So we've all heard the acronym for God to be Good Orderly Direction. Ever wonder how it got its start in A.A.?

"To some of us, the idea of substituting 'good' for 'God' in the Twelve Steps will seem like a watering down of A.A.'s message. But here we must remember that A.A.'s Steps are suggestions only. A belief in them, as they stand, is not at all a requirement for membership among us. This liberty has made A.A. available to thousands who never would have tried at all had we insisted on the Twelve Steps just as written." ⁹

"...We obey A.A.'s Steps and Traditions because we really want them for ourselves. It is no longer a question of good or evil; we conform because we genuinely want to conform. Such is our process of growth in unity and in function. Such is the evidence of God's grace and love among us.

"Much of our discussion so far leads straight to Tradition Five, which states: 'Each group has but one primary purpose-to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.'

"We think we should do one thing well rather than many things to which we are not called. That is the central idea of this tradition. Our society gathers in unity around this concept. The very life of our fellowship requires its preservation." ¹⁰

"A.A.'s Twelfth Step, carrying the message, is the basic service that our fellowship gives; it is our principal aim and the main reason for our existence. A.A. is more than a set of principles; it is a society of recovered alcoholics in action. We *must* carry A.A.'s message; otherwise we ourselves may fall into decay and those who have not yet been given the truth may die. That is why we so often say that *action* is the magic word. Action to carry A.A.'s message is therefore the heart of our Third Legacy of service." ¹¹

"THERAPUTIC MECHANISM OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS 1 BY HARRY M. TIEBOUT, M.D. Greenwich, Connecticut

"(Reprinted by permission from *The American Journal of Psychiatry*, January, 1944. Dr. Harry's first paper on the subject of Alcoholics Anonymous. Three recent papers are indexed at the close of this one.)

"The work of Alcoholics Anonymous has a threefold aspect. First, the group has weekly gatherings where experiences are related and problems discussed. Second, all are urged to read their book, Alcoholics Anonymous, which contains their basic tenets and must be read if one is to arrive at any understanding of their program. Third, the members work with prospects who are making their initial contact with the group. Helping others is a two-way situation since it not only assists the beginner in his first efforts but also aids the helper, who derives from his efforts something which is essential for his continued sobriety.

"Statistics at the New York office of the organization read as follows:

5 recovered at the end of the first year.

15 recovered at the end of the second year.

40 recovered at the end of the third year.

100 recovered at the end of the fourth year.

400 recovered at the end of the fifth year.

2000 recovered at the end of the sixth year.

8000 recovered at the end of the seventh year.



The Big Book Study Guide was developed by the Primary Purpose Group of Dallas -- the group that inspired OAPP. The purpose of the Study Guide is to enable the student to better understand the information the authors of the book, Alcoholics Anonymous, intended to impart to each of us based on their experience and knowledge of alcoholism and their Program of Recovery.

WORKING WITH OTHERS

(Pages 89 through 103)

We are then given directions on how to "sponsor" them into sobriety. Those of us who are willing to apply the experience and knowledge revealed in this Chapter will be blessed with many friends and realize the true joy of living. It is an experience we must not miss. If we do, we will very likely return to drinking and may never have another chance at sobriety.

Notice a rather significant change in the wording of this Chapter. Through the first Six Chapters, the word "we" is used extensively. He now begins using the word "you." He points his finger at each of us to make it clear as to whose responsibility it is to try to "Carry this message to other alcoholics!" It is the responsibility of each of us to protect our sobriety by searching out the still-suffering alcoholic and go to them with an attitude of love and service.

It is easier to stay sober than it is to sober up! Working with others is our insurance against returning to drink.

TO WIVES

(Pages 104 through 121)

Step Twelve states, "Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics and practice these principles in all our affairs." We have received the Promise: the spiritual awakening. We have received clear-cut directions on sponsorship. Now, we will be given directions on how to apply these principles to all our affairs.

Our Founders recognized that alcoholism is a family disease, that all who care about a suffering alcoholic also suffer. Oftentimes, their misery is even greater than that of the alcoholic. The alcoholic has a means of escape but, in most cases, the ones who love and care for the drinker must take it cold sober and experience much of what the alcoholic has missed while under the influence.

This Chapter will identify the problems the loved ones will experience as they continue life with the alcoholic. It provides a way in which to gauge where the drinker is in the progression of the disease. It then provides specific suggestions as to how one can go about trying to help the alcoholic begin to learn the truth. It then points out that, if the Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous can bring about the miracle of sobriety with the attendant promises of the Program, it can provide a path for their loved ones to find a spiritual way of life that will more than compensate them for the suffering and misery they have experienced.

From this Chapter came the wonderful Program of the Al-Anon Family Group. Without this Program, many suffering alcoholics would never have found a solution to their alcoholism. Al-Anon is a great friend to alcoholics and Alcoholics Anonymous.

THE FAMILY AFTERWARD

(Pages 122 through 135)

This Chapter is for the whole family. The alcoholic has found the Program of Alcoholics Anonymous as a solution for his problems. The family has found the Programs of Al-Anon, Alateen and/or Pre-teen as the solution to their problems. All is going well in their relationships within their respective Fellowships and in the world in general -- except for one of the most important places and that is in the home. As was pointed out in the preceding Chapter, when drinking ends, all the problems do not.

Before proceeding with the study of the material in this Chapter, go back to page 116 and begin reading at the middle of the page. Continue reading to the end of that Chapter to refresh your thinking. Chapter 9, "THE FAMILY AFTERWARD", shows each family member how to apply the Twelve Steps to family life and thereby bring the return of peace, harmony and love to the family unit.

Every member of Alcoholics Anonymous and Al-Anon should be knowledgeable of the information contained in this Chapter. It is truly a design for living.

TO EMPLOYERS

(Pages 136 through 150)

The authors of this Text Book were farsighted enough to recognize that, as alcoholics sobered up and began to return to a more normal type of life, they would, of course, be returning to the workplace. There is little doubt that any business employing a number of people will have in its midst, active alcoholics.

It is most easy for us to think of the ordinary contacts we might make in searching for the suffering ones such as doctors, ministers, attorneys, law enforcement agencies, hospitals, etc.; but all too often, one of the places offering the greatest potential is overlooked. That, of course, is the workplace. Some of our members have made certain that the Chief Executive Officer of their place of employment are recipients of the Big Book. In some cases, it is in keeping with their attempt to make amends for their past deeds or maybe just to try to make what could prove to be a significant contribution to their employer. In any case, it is more than possible that another suffering alcoholic will find our Program and thereby be spared from a tragic ending.

This is the only Chapter that was not drafted by Bill W... The principal author of this Section was Hank P., a terminated executive of a large corporation in the Northeast part of the country. He tells a little of his story as an introduction to his contribution here but, going back to "The Doctor's Opinion," Dr. Silkworth tells of the alcoholic who thought his case so hopeless that he had gone to a deserted barn to die. That hopeless alcoholic turned out to be Hank P., the author of this Chapter. His story, "The Unbeliever," can be found in the Original Manuscript and the First Edition of the Big Book.
