


The discussion of the seven primary colors from a scientific point of view shows us one thing; the variability of the human eye to see between the primary colors is part of our being. We in A.A. do not see the seventh part of the Steps, Traditions, or Concepts as an absolute. Each of them varies according to the alcoholic applying them. That comes from the fact that we are all different with needing different solutions to different problems. Ah, but our commonality makes working the three 7's alike in their application.

Let's start with Step Seven as to how this is. "Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings." ¹



The answer to this is no conundrum. It is no problem this far into the program of recovery of A.A. We understand that as we petition God through our prayers, and with thoughtful

meditation that we understand our defects of character, how they affect us and the relationships about us. Our thoughts and prayers are different for sure, but in every instance, we ask our God as we understood Him to help us (again) with our lives. Very often, meditation gives us no result other than

And yet, this pause while we contemplate "the wrong-doing of others, fancied or real..."² helps us understand 'what was my part in it.' From that we gain the impetus to look at ourselves and our problems and understand in full what we could have done different, and even, how we can correct it in the future, thereby removing one of our shortcomings. Facing blame head-on, we can admit it isn't always another other than ourselves that created an atmosphere, an environment, or a situation where things spiraled out of normal relations and behavior.

We are not always at fault. To say that is to say it's not a perfect world out there. We can't be trapped in our own guilt feelings. It is an imperfect world, we are an imperfect being. Our attempt at living humbly leads us to many times avoid people, places and things were we know from previous experience that it is hopeless to try to get along with some others. In this we are right to remain away, and not exacerbate the situation just through our presence, which gives others their self appointed right to tie us to the whipping post yet again. And the guilt by association they foster on our loved ones is to be held at bay at all times. We have gained a history of sobriety, of being changed, of trying to live a right life. We became our willingness to humbly ask for help. So to our innermost child seeking answers, we are not alone and have learned the answer through humility.

TRADITION SEVEN

The Seventh Tradition suggests humility and the care of others through our action(s). "Every A.A. group ought to be fully self supporting, declining outside contributions." ³ By our being generous to the Group, District, Area, and the G.S.O. we make it possible for the Service Work of each of these entities. It is a fact at times that any group may need our generosity just to continue to keep the doors open. Bill W. addresses this in particular in part of his essay on the Seventh Tradition, and it is as true today as the day it was written.

"The meeting night was at New York's old 24th Street Clubhouse. During the intermission, the treasurer gave a timid talk on how broke the club was. (That was in the period when you couldn't mix money and A.A.) But finally he said it – the landlord would put us out if we didn't pay up. He concluded his remarks by saying, 'Now boys, please go heavier on the hat tonight, will you?'

"I heard all this quite plainly, as I was piously trying to convert a newcomer who sat next to me. The hat came in my direction, and I reached into my pocket. Still working on my prospect, I fumbled and came up with a fity-cent piece. Somehow it looked like a very big coin. Hastily, I dropped it back and fished out a dime, which clinked thinly as I dropped it in the hat. Hats never got folding money in those days.

"Then I woke up. I who had boasted my generosity that morning was treating my own club worse than the distant alcoholics who had forgotten to send the Foundation their dollars. I realized that my five-dollar gift to the slipee was an ego-feeding proposition, bad for him and bad for me. There was a place in A.A. where spirituality and money would mix, and that was in the hat!"



CONCEPT SEVEN

"The Charter and Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments, empowering the trustees to manage and conduct world service affairs. The Conference Charter is not a legal document; it relies upon tradition and the A.A. purse for final effectiveness." ⁵

As discussed in the study of Tradition Seven, the members are relied upon for their contributions to keep A.A. Service Work effective. Concept Seven takes it much further, by stating the Charter and Bylaws of the General Service Board as being legal instruments; it directs the trustees to have responsibility of world service affairs. Refer again to the "upside down triangle" which is the diagram of the A.A. Conference Structure.



So as the trustees manage the daily operation of Alcoholic Anonymous World Services, they are also overseen by the entire General Service Board. Page three of this Newsletter has a write up from aa.org on how the General Service Office operates with the oversight of the General Service Board which includes all the committees of Service Work for Alcoholic Anonymous World Services.

GENERAL SERVICE OFFICE & GENERAL SERVICE BOARD

"How G.S.O. Serves A.A.

"The General Service Office in New York City serves all A.A. groups in the United States and Canada. G.S.O also offers services to A.A. overseas, especially in countries where there is no service structure. Many other countries have their own general service offices as well. The U.S./ Canada office works with committees of A.A.'s General Service Board and the General Service Conference (U.S. and Canada). G.S.O. has broad responsibilities to its member groups, including the following:

• To collect and organize shared experience on group challenges and solutions, and to pass this information along to A.A. groups and members throughout the U.S. and Canada when asked.

• To work with alcoholics overseas and in the armed forces; with those living in areas with no meetings; with housebound and seagoing A.A.s; and with members in treatment and correctional facilities.

• To respond to letters requesting information about A.A. and the help it provides for alcoholics.

• To publish the A.A. newsletter, Box 4-5-9, and other bulletins; to publish and distribute A.A. books and pamphlets approved by the General Service Conference; and to provide a sampling of complimentary literature and service materials to each new group.

• To disseminate public information at the national and international levels for A.A. as a whole, in cooperation with print and electronic media as well as with organizations concerned with the treatment of alcoholism.

• To coordinate and support the work of General Service Conference committees.

• To maintain the G.S.O. Archives.

• To operate and maintain the aa.org website and the Meeting Guide app."⁷

"To avoid falling into confusion over the names these defects should be called, let's take a universally recognized list of major human failings -- the Seven Deadly Sins of pride, greed, lust, anger, gluttony, envy, and sloth."

"The **bold** type presents definitions from Webster's Unabridged Dictionary.

"PRIDE: An over high opinion of oneself; exaggerated self-esteem; conceit, arrogance, vanity, self-satisfaction.

"GREED: Excessive desire for acquiring or having; desire for more than one needs or deserves.

"LUST: To feel an intense desire, especially sexual desire; to long: after or for.

"ANGER: A strong feeling excited by a real or supposed injury; often accompanied by a desire to take vengeance, or to obtain satisfaction from the offending party; resentment; wrath.


"GLUTTONY: One who eats too much. One with a great capacity for something; as, a glutton for work.

Seven Deadly Sins and how to find in the Bible

1. Pride is an excessive view of one's self without regard for others. Jeremiah 9:23-24.

2. Greed is an excessive pursuit of material goods. Hebrews 13:5.

3. Lust is a strong passion or longing, especially for sexual desires. 2 Timothy 2:22.

4. Wrath is a strong anger and hate towards another person. Romans 12:19.

5. Gluttony is an excessive and ongoing eating of food or drink. 1 Corinthians 10:31.

6. Envy is the intense desire to have an item that someone else possesses. Proverbs 14:30.

7. Sloth is an excessive laziness or the failure to act and utilize one's talents. Proverbs 6:6.

As the Bible was written nearly 2,000 years before the book Alcoholics Anonymous, it is considered a primary source for many different thoughts and writings. It is the best selling book of all time with over 5 billions copies having been sold. But it is not alone in its helpfulness to one trying to understand human nature and frailties of the mind and behaviors. One of the things it talks about, and is about, is God. Well, so is the Big Book. "And it means, of course, that we are going to talk about God." Alcoholics Anonymous, WE AGNOSTICS, page 45.

In the program of recovery, Alcoholics Anonymous, it is suggested to use a Higher Power, a God as we understood Him in the care of our lives. What are some definitions of God that may be helpful? First, before we ask Him humbly to remove our shortcomings in Step Seven, we need to have an understanding of who/what this petition of our life is going to. In the case of atheists and agnostics, I can't say what their approach would be, but I do know that many have the ability to be honest with themselves, and grasp a lifestyle of rigorous honesty which is a tenet to change. We all have had to let go of old ideas and be fearless from the very start. As we stood at the turning point, we all recognized the change that had to be a part of us in order to facilitate the needed change. So next is a discussion of God, then interpret it any way you see fit (or not) to gain sanity, sobriety, and serenity. Remember when we said we were willing to go any length to get it.

WHAT or WHO is GOD?

First it must be stated that I am a Roman Catholic and have my own ideas about God since being in a parochial school for eleven years. There were periods in my life where I took myself away from my own ideals and God. The Big Book states who I was in this passage, "But soon the sense of His presence had been blotted out by worldly clamors, mostly those within myself." ⁸

So this article is in no way a sense of trying to convert, or explain to anyone how or what they should understand.

"In monotheistic thought, God is usually viewed as the supreme being, creator, and principal object of faith. God is usually conceived of as being omnipotent, omniscient, omnipresent and omnibenevolent as well as having an eternal and necessary existence. God is most often held to be incorporeal, with said characteristic being related to conceptions of transcendence or immanence.

"Some religions describe God without reference to gender, while others use terminology that is gender-specific and genderbiased. God has been conceived as either personal or impersonal. In theism, God is the creator and sustainer of the universe, while in deism, God is the creator, but not the sustainer, of the universe. In pantheism, God is the universe itself. Atheism is an absence of belief in any God or deity, while agnosticism deems the existence of God unknown or unknowable. God has also been conceived as the source of all moral obligation, and the 'greatest conceivable existent'. Many notable philosophers have developed arguments for and against the existence of God.⁹

The Seven Deadly Sins mentioned in the Bible have been a source of curiosity, inspiration and reflection throughout history. One of the most famous works on them is Dante Alighieri's DIVINE COMEDY written in 1314 A.D. It is not a true story; it is a work of fiction. As hell cannot be proved, it stands to reason it is a work of imagination.

"Inferno (Italian: [iŋ' fɛrno]; Italian for "Hell") is the first part of DIVINE COMEDY. Purgatorio and Paradiso follow the Inferno. "The Inferno describes Dante's journey through Hell, guided by the ancient Roman poet Virgil. In the poem, Hell is depicted as nine concentric circles of torment located within the Earth; it is the "realm ... of those who have rejected spiritual values by yielding to bestial appetites or violence, or by perverting their human intellect to fraud or malice against their fellowmen.".¹⁰ Dante added two components pass the deadly sins. They are Treachery (Fraud) and Violence .

Before an illustration of Dante's Hell is presented, it is time to bring out what the corrections can we make in our lives to avoid the Seven Deadly Sins. Not that the sins themselves may kill you; but maybe someone you offended and hurt and violated by practicing them might! Certainly anything is possible in this world we live in; the days of "an honorable duel" are gone. (Well, gluttony has a good chance of doing you in. Like alcoholism, it's self inflicted and as seen below, requires the same action and thought behavior to achieve success over the defect).

The Seven Contrary Virtues which are specific opposites to the Seven Deadly Sins: Liberality (the quality of giving) against greed, Patience against anger, Kindness against envy, Abstinence against gluttony, Chastity against lust, Humility against pride, and Diligence against sloth.¹¹




Virtues are reaching up and past and above former thoughts and behaviors.

Quote of the Week

"Half measures do avail us something-it's just the half we don't want."

Before sobriety, I was a master of "half measuring" in my life, and what I got was the half I didn't want. At work I arrived late, did just enough to get by, and was the first to leave. The result was that I was fired a lot. In relationships, I paid attention just enough to get what I wanted and wasn't very interested in doing what she wanted to do. The result was that my relationships didn't last very long. I half measured my way through school, my family, and my health, and the results I got were always the half I didn't want.

In the beginning of the program, I was half measuring it as well. I showed up late, sat in the back, didn't help clean up, and wouldn't go to fellowship. After complaining to my sponsor that the program wasn't working, he quickly pointed to my half-measure attempts and the half-measure results I was getting. If I wanted to be happy, joyous, and free, he told me, then I would have to give the program everything I had.

Once I became willing to do whatever it took to get and maintain sobriety, things did begin to change. When I arrived early and greeted people, I became known and felt a part of. When I started sharing what was really going on, I felt better. And when I really worked the Steps, I began to recover, and the desire to drink and use lessened and finally left me. Today, I no longer half measure my way through life, and because of that, I get to enjoy the full benefits of everything I do.

As the person above talks about, our attitude had to change, our sense of humility must be cultivated; we had to go to work. Over and over he is reminded that "...have to give everything...", "...to do whatever it took..." That was not the half measures he had been living. We were no different at all if we didn't follow the suggestions of not only the Steps, but the Traditions as well where the first one talks about our common welfare and unity. We had to belong to become willing to follow the suggestions that could lead us to a new style, one of a spiritual existence rather than a material one. Even the Big Book reminds to go all in, for good reason too.

Just got... "recovery-shamed"?

I don't know what else to call it. I have a tendency to make little jokes at my own expense to kinda normalize recovery. I happened to be somewhere in public and was offered a drink so I made a self deprecating joke about being an alcoholic, singing the Lays jingle but about booze "no one can drink just one.." Etc. You get it. Some rando behind me started berating me about not taking recovery seriously and how they are also in recovery and "it's not some f*cking joke" and so on. I tried to smooth it over and be supportive but I just ended up leaving the place because they had just wouldn't stop.

Seriously, y'all, be kind to each other and remember that everyone's journey is different. The world would be a boring place if we were all the same.

It's crazy to hear someone else tell your story after so many years of feeling isolated.

Today marks my 5th day sober, and my first meeting was completed. I've been struggling with alcohol for 15 years, and never thought AA would help, because I am not a religious person. I'm still not sure how I will handle that, but I'm still on step 1. More importantly, I didn't drink today.

"The more you sweat in peace, the less you bleed in war." Is your program a crisis management tool or a preventative maintenance plan?

I used to look for the chapter "why it works" and never found it. I am baffled but pleased too.

Me: My name is Matt, and I'm an alcoholic. AAA: This is AAA, not AA. Me: Yeah, I was just explaining how my car got in the lake.

I once made an apathetic club. No one cared enough to attend the meetings, though.

Phil, James, and Doug were at an A.A. convention together sharing a large suite at the top of the hotel. After a long day of meetings, they were shocked to hear the elevators were broken, and they now had to climb 12 flights of stairs.

Phil said to Jim and John," Let's break the monotony of this unpleasant task by concentrating on something more interesting. Hmm, I'll tell jokes the first 4 floors, Jim, you can sing songs the next 4 floors and Doug you can say your collection of sad stories the last 4 floors."

The others agreed and they started the climb for their hotel room. At the 26th floor Phil stopped with his jokes and Jim started his songs. At the 51st floor songs stopped and John's sad stories started.

"I guess I'll begin with my saddest story first. I forgot the room key in the car. And that's a lot of Steps"

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Concept VII


The Conference recognizes that the Charter and the Bylaus of the General Service Board are legal instruments: that the Trustees are thereby fully empowered to manage and conduct all of the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is further understood that the Conference Charter itself is not a legal document: that it relies instead upon the force of tradition and the power of the A.A. purse for its final effectiveness.



This Concept attempts to clarify the relationship and "balance of powers" between the Conference and the General Service Board. "This . . . may look like the collision of an irresistible force with an immovable object." On the one hand, "the board is invested with complete legal power over AA's funds and services; on the other hand the Conference is clothed with such great influence and financial power it could overcome the legal rights of the board.

"Thus, the practical power of the Conference is, in the final analysis, superior to the legal power of the board. This superior power derives from the traditional influence of the Conference Charter itself; from the fact that the delegates chosen by the groups always constitute more than two-thirds of the Conference members"; and finally from the ability of the delegates to cut off financial support by the groups. "Theoretically, the Conference is an advisory body only; but practically speaking, it has all the ultimate power it may ever need."

The Conference "recommends" — though its recommendations have the force of directives to the board. The board executes these recommendations. The board does have the legal authority to veto a Conference recommendation — but in actual practice, it never has done so. As Bill tactfully puts it, the trustees "simply refrain from using their legal right to say 'no' when it would be much wiser, all things considered, to say 'yes.'



"If... the Conference will always bear in mind actual rights, duties, responsibilities and legal status of the General Service Board, and if the trustees... will constantly realize that the Conference is the real seat of ultimate service authority... neither will be seriously tempted to make a 'rubber stamp' out of the other... In this way, grave issues will always be resolved and harmonious cooperation will be the general rule."

James P. has done an outstanding job in finding a printing company to handle the print job. In the last few years, many printing companies have closed up shop, including the one last used in 2021. Printing costs have gone up tremendously also. The company went with had the lowest costs, but is not an all-in-one company so locally out-sourced portions of the book were done, (cutting, folding, stapling). This added to the printing time, and the costs.

In 2021, the printing costs were \$ 0.295 per book. For the 2022 version, printing costs have gone up to \$ 0.60 per book. The F.A.U.C. is selling to individual books (up to a count of 20) for \$ 0.75 per book, and to groups at a pack of twenty for \$ 0.65 per book (+tax) unless the group is a non-profit.

That equates to \$ 13.00 for twenty books plus a tax of \$ 0.78 for a total of \$ 13.78 per pack of twenty. The extra charge is to cover future increases and also in this statement from the G.S.O. Guideline MG-02.

"3) Sale of Literature. Many service offices publish their own meeting lists; others also produce introductory pamphlets explaining A.A. These can be sold at a slight profit to help defray office expenses. It is also possible to buy books from G.S.O. for resale at the retail price, the profit going to support the central office. The Conference approved literature catalog describes various discounts."


