Have you wondered why an accidentally broken mirror gives you bad luck for SEVEN YEARS? It's a myth from ancient Rome. Legend says Rome was founded in 753 B.C. Over 50,000 road miles were built by 200 B.C. and several are still in use today. In September 476 A.D. the Germanic prince, Odovacar, deposed the last western emperor, Romulus Augustus. Odovacar's troops made him King of Italy, bringing an ignoble end, and the fall, of the long ancient history of Rome.

According to Israel Drazin, author of <u>Maimonides and the Biblical Prophets</u>, "the ancient Romans believed that when you looked in a mirror, the image you saw represented your soul." So if you broke a mirror, you also broke your soul.



The number seven was very special in ancient Rome. So special that the Romans believed that life "renewed itself every seven years. So if you broke a mirror, your soul was broken, but your luck would change after seven years." And while you probably won't actually get seven years' bad luck if you break a mirror...now you know! We of A.A. know it doesn't take that long to change your luck...

"Dressed to the nines" is a statement British in origin; meaning elaborately dressed to perfection.

That is something we of A.A. know to be near and likely impossible, that so called "perfection".

"We shall need to raise our eyes toward perfection, and be ready to walk in that direction."<sup>1</sup> "We shall look for progress, not for perfection."<sup>2</sup>

This issue will deal with the 'nines' of the program of recovery known as Alcoholics Anonymous. Specifically Step Nine, Tradition Nine, and Concept Nine. "As we work the first nine Steps, we prepare ourselves for the adventure of a new life." <sup>3</sup> Step Nine says, "Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others." <sup>4</sup>

"Good judgment, a careful sense of timing, courage, and prudence -- these are the qualities we shall need when we take Step Nine." <sup>5</sup>

The spiritual principle of Step Nine as defined by Bill W. is "DISCIPLINE – Training that corrects, molds, or perfects the mental faculties or moral character; to bring under control; to train or develop by instruction."<sup>6</sup>

"Great suffering and great love are A.A.'s disciplinarian..." <sup>7</sup> Another is "Brotherly-Love". <sup>8</sup> "It is known in the rooms of A.A. that the spiritual principles are the Twelve Steps. To be thorough, the 36 principles are the Twelve Steps, Twelve Traditions and Twelve Concepts." <sup>6 ibid</sup>

Step Nine works the Step Eight willingness. As in Step Five, "The rule is we must be hard on ourself, but always considerate of others." <sup>9</sup> "Their defects may be glaring, but the chances are that our own actions are partly responsible." <sup>10</sup> It is said there are no rules in A.A., only suggestions. However, Bill W. did point out a few rules; "Live and let live is the rule." <sup>11</sup> "So our rule is not to avoid a place where there is drinking, if we have a legitimate reason for being there." <sup>12</sup> "Middleton Group #1, Rule #62...Don't take yourself to damn seriously." <sup>13</sup>

So are they rules or suggestions? "All of its Twelve Steps are but suggestions." <sup>14</sup> Suggestions are means of advisement. Rules are an accepted procedure, custom, or habit. With the advisements to recover, there are certain things we do to achieve this normal new life.

#### **TRADITION NINE**

Short Form – "A.A., as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve." <sup>15</sup>

Long Form - "Each A.A. group needs the least possible organization. Rotating leadership is the best. The small group may elect its secretary, the large group its rotating committee, and the groups of a large metropolitan area their central or intergroup committee, which often employs a fulltime secretary. The trustees of the General Service Board are, in effect, our A.A. General Service Committee. They are the custodians of our A.A. Tradition and the receivers of voluntary A.A. contributions by which we maintain our A.A. General Service Office at New York. They are authorized by the groups to handle our over-all public relations and they guarantee the integrity of our principle newspaper, the A.A. Grapevine. All such representatives are to be guided in the spirit of service, for true leaders in A.A. are but trusted and experienced servants of the whole. They derive no real authority from their titles; they do not govern. Universal respect is the key to their usefulness."<sup>16</sup>

This Tradition states that A.A. is not organized; however, there are service boards and committees to do work as trusted servants. The Trustee's Service Committees report to the General Service Board (whence they come from), and to the A.A. World Services Board. See the illustration on page 6 of this Newsletter from "THE A.A. ### **CONCEPT IX**

Short Form: "Good service leadership at all levels is indispensable for our future functioning and safety. Primary world service leadership, once exercised by the founders, must necessarily be assumed by the trustees." <sup>17</sup>

Long Form: "Good service leaders, together with sound and appropriate methods of choosing them, are at all levels indispensable for our future functioning and safety. The primary world service once exercise by the founders of A.A. must necessarily be assumed by the Trustees of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous."<sup>18</sup>

Concept IX reiterates that the Trustees 1) are responsible for A.A. functioning at the General Service Board level; 2) Trustees are responsible for the primary world service.

Furthermore, good service leaders start at the group level as explained here; "Due to A.A.'s principle of rotation, furnishing our service structure with able and willing workers has to be a continuous effort. The base of the service structure — and the source of our leadership — is the General Service Representative. The G.S.R. is the service leader for his or her group, the indispensable link between the group and A.A. as-a-whole. Together the G.S.R.s are A.A.'s group conscience — and together, in their areas, they elect the area committee members and ultimately the delegates and the area's candidates for trustee. Groups who have not named G.S.R.s should be encouraged to do so. And as the G.S.R.s meet in area assemblies, care and dedication are required. Personal ambitions should be cast aside; feuds and controversies forgotten. 'Who are the best qualified people?' should be the thought of all."<sup>19</sup>



Not only that, her words left me in a state of being very humbled.  $\sim$  Editor  $\sim$ 









#### INTO ACTION

#### (Page 76 - continued)

Now we need more action, without which we find that "Faith without works is dead." Let's look at *Steps Eight and Nine.* We have a list of all persons we have harmed and to whom we are willing to make amends. We made it when we took inventory. We subjected ourselves to a drastic self-appraisal. Now we go out to our fellows and repair the damage done in the past. We attempt to sweep away the debris which has accumulated out of our effort to live on self-will and run the show ourselves. If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes. Remember it was agreed at the beginning we would go to any lengths for victory over alcohol. Alcoholics Anonymous, INTO ACTION, p. 76.

Comment: The following is the Eighth Step Prayer. Remember that we were promised we would be given some willingness as we did Step Four.

"If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes."

Comment: Step Nine is the Step that lets us forgive those we have hated, feared, wished bad times toward, etc... Who, on your Fourth Step lists, did you not have ill feelings toward? If we want to be forgiven, we must forgive and then we are free!!!

Comment: From this point in Chapter 6 to the last paragraph on page 83, we will be told WHEN & HOW to "make direct amends to those we have harmed, except when to do so would hurt them or someone else" for specific situations and WHAT the results will be. Watch for them.

# The Twelve Concepts for World Service

How Bill W. explained the spiritual principles that undergird A.A.'s structure and how the parts work together.

Title and CONCEPT X: From the pamphlet "P-8 Twelve Concepts for World Service illustrated",

CONCEPT IX is on pages 20 & 21.

**Concept X** 

Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority the scope of such authority to be always well defined whether by tradition, by resolution, by specific job description or by appropriate charters and bylaws.

ur service structure cannot function effectively and harmoniously unless, at every level, each operational responsibility is matched by a corresponding authority to discharge it. This requires that authority must be *delegated* at every level — and that the responsibility and authority of every entity are well defined and clearly understood.

As we have seen (Concept I) "final responsibility and ultimate authority" reside with the A.A. groups, and they *delegate* this authority to the Conference (Concept II). The Conference, in turn, delegates to the General Service Board the authority to manage A.A.'s affairs (Concept VI) in its behalf. The board is in authority over its subsidiary operating corporations — A.A. World Services, Inc. and AA Grapevine, Inc. - but it *delegates* to the directors of those corporations the authority necessary to run these service entities. The directors are in authority over the executives of the corporations, but delegate to these officers the authority needed to carry out their administrative responsibilities. And finally, the executives *delegate* to the G.S.O. and Grapevine staff members and other employees the *authority* necessary to carry out their important service jobs.

Authority and Responsibility are well defined . . . .
