Number 10 symbolizes the completion of a cycle.

The first letter in the Greek word "deca" (ten) is formed like a triangle.

1+2+3+4 (=10), is called the tetraktys. Bowling pins are arranged in the tetraktys shape.

The length of your hand (if adult) is 1/10 of your total height.

There are ten letters on the Snellen Chart. The Snellen Chart was created by ophthalmologist Hermann Snellen (Dutch) in 1862. The ten letters are: C - D - E - F - L - N - O - P - T - Z.

The Richter scale is measured in tenfold increase of energy. The Richter scale measures the strength of earthquakes. It is named after Charles Richter who developed the scale. Using this scale an earthquake with 7 points is ten times more powerful than an earthquake with 6 points. An earthquake with 10 points on the Richter scale has never been recorded. Earthquakes at 6 and above are considered to be serious and can cause immense damage.

Numerology - The number 10 is comfortable with being alone (like the number 1), and it recognizes the need for individualism while being part of the whole.

Step 10 has one continuing a personal inventory.


Tradition 10 has A.A. with no opinion on outside issues and avoiding controversy.

Concept 10 has service responsibility being matched by an equal service authority.

So A.A. completes a cycle following the tens. A habit of personal inventory leads us to avoiding

controversy which in turn has service work inventoried by an appropriate service authority.

Step Ten is a Step that has one reviewing the previous nine Steps taken. None of the Steps are a "one and done" ordeal. To be sure, our dependence on alcohol that led us to powerlessness over it and the unmanageability of our lives is never a Step to be taken lightly, once, or of any further consideration. While it is true the obsession can, and will leave us; one keeps stampeding wild horses in a corral due to potential consequences. At one point and time, these wild horses (maybe ridden by wild people!) can be settled; and made useful through love, perseverance, and patience. To all who know this for a fact, for all those who may encounter this demolishing of lives, read (maybe again) page 151 of the Big Book where these hideous Four Horsemen are described. "The less people tolerated us, the more we withdrew from society, from life itself. As we became subjects of King Alcohol, shivering denizens of his mad realm, the chilling vapor that is loneliness settled down. It thickened, ever becoming blacker. Some of us sought out sordid places, hoping to find understanding companionship and approval. Momentarily we did – then would come oblivion and the awful awakening to face the hideous Four Horsemen – Terror, Bewilderment, Frustration, Despair. Unhappy drinkers who read this page will understand!" 1

THE TWELVE STEPS

- 1. We admitted we were powerless over alcohol that our lives had become unmanageable.
- 2. Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
- 3. Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.
- 4. Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
- 5. Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being, the exact nature of our wrongs.
- 6. Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
- 7. Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.
- 8. Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- 9. Made direct amends to such people where ever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- 10. Continue to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
- 11. Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
- 12. Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs. (Page 59-60, 4th edition of Alcoholics Anonymous.

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The goal isn't just to be sober, the goal is to build a life you don't need to escape from.

"I do not hold with those who believe that alcoholism is entirely a problem of mental control. I have had many men who had, for example, worked a period of months on some problem or business deal which was to be settled on a certain date, favorably to them. They took a drink a day or so prior to the date, and then the phenomenon of craving at once became paramount to all other interests so that the important appointment was not met. These men were not drinking to escape; they were drinking to overcome a craving beyond their mental control. ... Very truly yours, William D, Silkworth, M.D." ³

"He had a desperate desire to stop, but saw no way out, for he had earnestly tried many avenues of escape." ⁴

"We, in our turn, sought the same escape with all the desperation of drowning men." ⁵

"His only chance for sobriety would be some place like the Greenland Ice Cap, and even there an Eskimo might turn up with a bottle of scotch and ruin everything!" ⁶

So then, Eskimos do not live in Greenland, Inuits do. Furthermore, the Greenland Ice Cap does not touch Alaska (not even in 1939). But the sentiment narrated is true.

Step Two takes us in a direction to find the insanity in our lives by recognizing how to regain the sanity. It is through restoration, a process of action to put back in place a former condition. Does not matter if we were 9 or 69 when we began drinking and acquired the traits of an alcoholic, at one point in time, we were not. It is to this stable, sane, rational human existence that we seek through the Power of One greater than ourselves.

"We were now at Step Three. Many of us said to our Maker, as we understood Him: 'God, I offer myself to Thee-to build with me and to do with me as Thou wilt. Relieve me of the bondage of self, that I may better do Thy will. Take away my difficulties, that victory over them may bear witness to those I would help of Thy Power, Thy Love, and Thy Way of life. May I do Thy will always!' We thought well before taking this step making sure we were ready; that we could at last abandon ourselves utterly to Him."

Step 4. Step Four directions are on page 64, paragraph 1, lines 1-9; paragraph 2 lines 1-6 (Assets and Liabilities checklist); (Resentments) page 64, paragraph 3, lines 1-2, 6-9; (Fears) page 68, paragraph 1, lines 1-3; and (Harms)page 69, paragraph 1, lines 1-6.

The text of the Big Book does not use the words "Assets" or "Liabilities" – but it is understood from what it says, that assets and liabilities are disclosed.

"A business which takes no regular inventory usually goes broke. Taking a commercial inventory is a fact-finding and a fact-facing process. It is an effort to discover the truth about the stock-in-trade. One object is to disclose damaged or unsalable goods, to get rid of them promptly and without regret. If the owner of the business is to be successful, he cannot fool himself about values."

Each good discarded is a Liability. Those kept are an Asset.

The previous author laid out the thoughts that became part of Step 5 where "the exact nature of our wrongs" became part of the "Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being ...". For some, due to their thoughts of previous action and behavior, it becomes hard to find "another human being" who is to hear "the exact nature of our wrongs." Some help and direction is found in the Big Book.

"If we cannot or would rather not do this, we search our acquaintance for a close-mouthed, understanding friend. Perhaps our doctor or psychologist will be the person. It may be one of our own family, but we cannot disclose anything to our wives or our parents which will hurt them and make them unhappy. We have no right to save our own skin at another person's expense. Such parts of our story we tell to someone who will understand, yet be unaffected. The rule is we must be hard on ourself, but always considerate of others.

Notwithstanding the great necessity for discussing ourselves with someone, it may be one is so situated that there is no suitable person available. If that is so, this step may be postponed, only, however, if we hold ourselves in complete readiness to go through with it at the first opportunity..." 9 Continued on page 6.





"We say this because we are very anxious that we talk to the right person. It is important that he be able to keep a confidence; that he fully understand and approve what we are driving at; ^{9 ibid} that he will not try to change our plan. But we must not use this as a mere excuse to postpone.

When we decide who is to hear our story, we waste no time. We have a written inventory and we are prepared for a long talk. We explain to our partner what we are about to do and why we have to do it. He should realize that we are engaged upon a life-and-death errand. Most people approached in this way will be glad to help; they will be honored by our confidence." ¹⁰

Step 5, when complete, is a big stride toward freedom from alcohol. Past wrongs considered and communicated in a gratefulness of loss of bondage brings one to the threshold of peace of mind in growth towards Honesty, Open mindedness and Willingness (HOW). It really does feel good.

"We can look the world in the eye. We can be alone at perfect peace and ease. Our fears fall from us. We begin to feel the nearness of our Creator. We may have had certain spiritual beliefs, but now we begin to have a spiritual experience." ¹¹ These are Step 5 promises which illustrate the peace, fearlessness, and nearness to freedom gained.

It's only after we've lost EVERYTHING that we're free to do ANYTHING

Step 6 relies on Willingness and Honesty. When we are "entirely ready" and have removal of "all these defects of character" we have reached the Open mindedness needed for change.

Step 7 now has us petitioning for help. When we focus on our increasing our Assets in practice instead of Liabilities in action, we see shortcomings becoming a lesser part of our daily life.

Step 6 directions give us this: "We have emphasized willingness as being indispensable. Are we now ready to let God remove from us all the things which we have admitted are objectionable? Can He now take them all - every one? If we still cling to something we will not let go, we ask God to help us be willing." ¹²

The directions for Step 7 are called the Step 7 prayer. "When ready, we say something like this: 'My Creator, I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here, to do your bidding. Amen.' We have then completed Step Seven." ¹³

Steps 8 and 9 go together from a stand point of the list asked for in Step 8 was completed in the Step 4 work and Step 9 then becomes the action to address our defaults to others identified. The directions read as thus; "Now we need more action, without which we find that "Faith without works is dead." Let's look at Steps Eight and Nine. We have a list of all persons we have harmed and to whom we are willing to make amends. We made it when we took inventory. We subjected ourselves to a drastic self-appraisal. Now we go out to our fellows and repair the damage done in the past. We attempt to sweep away the debris which has accumulated out of our effort to live on self-will and run the show ourselves. If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes. Remember it was agreed at the beginning we would go to any lengths for victory over alcohol." 14



Now Step 10 needs a conclusion. When it asks for 'Continued to take", what is this time span? It has been explained that "continued" is "on-going." What does the Big Book have to say about this?

"What we really have is a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of our spiritual condition. Every day is a day when we must carry the vision of God's will into all of our activities." ¹⁵

TRADITION 10

"Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues: hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy." ¹⁶ (Short form).

"No AA group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate AA, express any opinion on outside controversial issues—particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever." ¹⁷ (Long form).

How is it known that a group has no opinion and therefore no opinion on outside issues? It comes through the group conscience of Tradition 2. "For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority...a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants...they do not govern." ¹⁸

The group conscience is an inventory of the group members on topics concerning the group, and (hopefully) the GSR will be the trusted servant to provide that A.A. Traditions are followed.

CONCEPT 10

"Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority, with the scope of such authority well defined." ¹⁹ (Short form).

"Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority—the scope of such authority to be always well defined whether by tradition, by resolution, by specific job description or by appropriate charters and bylaws." ²⁰ (Long form).

At the group level, each service responsibility is on the dictates of the group drawn up through the group conscious that the GSR is delegated to uphold to the A.A. Traditions. These may be, a chair for the group, a treasurer, a secretary, and maybe other service work the group can do. All of this through an inventory of the group's needs by the members.

So what has transpired is a personal inventory on a continuous basis, a group inventory of their public voice, and a group inventory of their needs and the service work they may be able to provide.



'That wasn't good': Florida woman tries — and fails — to beat DUI test by Irish folk dancing August 27, 2022 | 9:13pm

A Florida woman pulled over for alleged drunken driving performed an Irish folk dance for cops in an attempt to prove her sobriety, video shows.

April 27, cops told WFLA. When Pinellas County deputies arrived, officers said her eyes were bloodshot and watery.

tried to walk a straight line during a sobriety test along a parking space marker when she gave up and started dancing, the video, which emerged Saturday, showed.




