The month of March is named after Mars. In ancient times, Mars was the supreme n father god. Mars was initially an agricultural god to the Romans; in governing the growing п vegetation through fruitfulness, the holiness, and well-being of the crops. Above all, Mars was the divine keeper of the land, and this n. month is the time for spring to start. This connection between Mars, the land and н springtime, renders symbolism of new growth, renewed life, reestablishment and n outpouring of energy. As a patriarchal god, Mars is figurative of a father's concerns such as: Giving, Shelter, and Structure. n

The third Step of the A.A. program of recovery can relate to the qualities of the ancient god Mars. The third month of the year can also as spring begins and new growth becomes apparent, albeit slowly. For it is in this third Step that we begin a change in ourselves that is new growth, new direction, and new guidance to a fruitful and satisfying lifestyle.

Step 3 reads: "Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him."

- Mars was 'divine keeper' of the land ٠ providing the 'well-being'; relate that to "the care of God".²
- Mars was the father god providing 'Giving, Shelter, and Structure'; relate that to a "God as we understood Him", ^{1 ibid}

It is in this Third Step that we are able to get rid of our reliance on self = many times misconstrued in behaviors and thought patterns that are not beneficial.

The Third Step Prayer reads: "God I offer myself to Thee - to build with me and to do with me as Thou wilt. Relieve me of the bondage of self, that I may better do Thy will. Take away my difficulties, that victory over them may bear witness to those I would help of Thy Power, Thy Love and Thy way of life. May I do Thy will always."³

sacred animals. This provides you an understanding foundation of: Protection, Communication, Assertion, and Instinct, which are symbolic traits of the wolf.



The Third Step Prayer asks for help to change our self through, and with, a "God as we understood Him". ¹ ibid "...bondage of Self" ³ ibid and "difficulties" ^{3 ibid} are of our own making. Going back to the god Mars, one finds 'new growth, renewed life, reestablishment and outpouring of energy.' Relate that to the Third Step Prayer where "build with me... victory... would help ... "^{3 ibid}

The Wolf, one of the sacred animals - meaning revered or esteemed - has traits also that carry on into our new growth and change. Foremost is our honest communication. Then we apply this new way of life ourselves. No human power has the power to do this.

Instinct becomes a new learned thought pattern and guides our behavior. Think not? The use of instinct as an adjective means "imbued or filled with (a quality, especially a desirable one)."⁴ The origin of the word instinct comes from Latin, 'instinctus' and later in Middle English as is in 'instigation or impulse'.

An example of learned behavior becoming instinct is this: You are not born knowing not to touch a hot iron. Experience is the best teacher, but it hurts at times.

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Origin of the Prayer of St. Francis

The prayer of St. Francis was first recorded in 1912 in France, in a spiritual magazine called La Clochette (The Little Bell). The magazine was published by a Catholic group called The Holy Mass League. The group was established by Father Esther Bouquerel in 1901.

In the version published in La Clochette, the prayer was entitled, in French, "A Beautiful Prayer to Say During the Mass". Since it was published anonymously, the original author is not known. Possibly, Father Bouquerel himself could have written the prayer.

Eventually, in 1915, the prayer was sent to Pope Benedict XV, still written in its original French. A year later, in 1916, it appeared in the daily newspaper of the Vatican, and it was then written in Italian. Later on, around 1920, a French Franciscan priest printed the prayer on the back of the image of St. Francis of Assisi. It bore the title "Prayer for Peace" in French. At this time, though, it was not attributed to St. Francis. The first time it was attributed to him was in 1927, by a French Protestant group called "The Knights of the Prince of Peace".

Between the two world wars, the prayer made its way to Europe, eventually being translated into English. The first known English translation appeared in a book entitled "Living Courageously" written by Kirby Page. He also attributed the prayer to St. Francis of Assisi.

During and after the Second World War, the prayer for peace was spread all over, and it already was known as the Prayer of St. Francis. The most widespread use of the prayer was through the books of Cardinal Francis Joseph Spellman, who was then Archbishop of New York.⁵

Prayer of Saint Francis of Assisi

"Lord, make me an instrument of thy peace that where there is hatred, I may bring love that where there is wrong, I may bring the spirit of forgiveness—

that where there is discord, I may bring harmony that where there is error, I may bring truth that where there is doubt, I may bring faith that where there is despair, I may bring hope that where there are shadows, I may bring light that where there is sadness, I may bring joy. Lord, grant that I may seek rather to comfort, than to be comforted to understand, than to be understood— To love, than to be loved.

For it is by self-forgetting that one finds.

It is by forgiving that one is forgiven.

It is by dying that one awakens to Eternal Life. Amen."⁶

The preceding prayer, as above, is more than one hundred years old, although it is affectionately attributed to St. Francis. A.A. refers to it as one of the prayers of the Eleventh Step.

The reference to it here in discussion of the Third Step is to make use of prayer, ("Prayer, as commonly understood, is a petition to God."⁷), to show us how and to facilitate the change desirable in us as "It is the proper use of the will."⁸ So in the exercising of this prayer, we ask to be more of usefulness than disparity.

TRADITION THREE

Short Form: "The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking." ⁹

Long Form: "Our membership ought to include all who suffer from alcoholism. Hence we may refuse none who wish to recover. Nor ought A.A. membership ever depend upon money or conformity. Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an A.A. group, provided that, as a group, they have no other affiliation."¹⁰

The next time you're at an A.A. meeting, look around and consider all of the diverse backgrounds and paths it took fellow members to earn their seat in that room.

Now consider that the message you may need to hear on any given day may not come from the most well-seasoned member with years in the fellowship who knows all the "right" ways to share or chair. Maybe the message will come from someone with one month sober, someone with an entirely different background, or from someone just coming back after a relapse. Or perhaps you'll find yourself sitting next to someone who, still reeking of alcohol, wants to know how a group of drunks (G.O.D.) manages to not pick up a drink one day at a time.

In A.A., there is room for every voice in the choir. Imagine how we'd all be cheated out of all the experience, strength, and hope we've benefited from around the rooms of A.A. if it was an exclusive club with laws and rules that barred people from entry even if they wanted to get sober!

It may be hard to imagine, but early A.A. groups refused to admit homeless people, beggars, prostitutes, inmates, homosexuals, and anyone else who members felt might harm the group. Only a "hypothetical class" ¹¹ of "pure alcoholics" ¹¹ ^{ibid} with no other complications was allowed. But "... experience taught us that to take away any alcoholic's full chance was sometimes to pronounce his death sentence ..." ¹²

In fact, the chapter TRADITION THREE in Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions says of those early A.A. days ". . . most of those who did join us were like flickering candles in a windstorm. Time after time, their uncertain flames blew out and couldn't be relighted."¹³


Thankfully, early A.A.'s came to their senses and eventually adopted Tradition Three.

Since then, many like that infamous member Ed in 12 & 12's TRADITION THREE chapter have walked into the rooms of AA. And many—who previously would have been tossed out of the rooms because they weren't "pure alcoholics" ^{11 ibid}—have stuck, stayed, and helped countless others.

Thank God for Tradition Three! It doesn't matter who you are, where you came from, what your circumstances are, or why you're sitting in an AA meeting. It's that common denominator that unites all of us.

As Brand New Day Francis says, "I'm a member when I say so, and I say so! Nobody can kick me out of here!"



CONCEPT III

"To insure effective leadership, we should endow each element of A.A. - the Conference, the General Service Board and its service corporations, staffs, committees, and executives – with a traditional 'Right of Decision'" ⁹

Here is the "Right of Decision", "…it should be the traditional right of all world service boards, committees, and executive to decide which problems they will dispose of themselves and upon which matters they will report, consult, or ask specific directions."¹⁰

"In this Third Concept, the various Boards, corporations (e.g., Grapevine), staffs, and committees are given the right to decide which problems they will dispose of themselves and upon which matters they will report, consult, or ask specific directions. In practice this concept means that AA's 'trusted servants' ought to carefully weigh the wishes of the members, but that they are also trusted to exercise their own judgment in the light of all circumstances, facts and arguments that become known to them during the voting or deliberation process." ¹¹



So the Publishing Department recommends a new "jacketless" Big Book, which will help to decrease printing and delivery delays of this important book. But approval is still needed; do we all agree with that recommendation to the General Service Conference?

Informed decisions come through deliberation during discussion using the "Right of Decision". Some concerns and/or issues are dealt with accordingly; others must be moved to a more appropriate committee.

This Concept is not to be confused with Tradition Four, "Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole." This Tradition is commonly referred to as the one that "Gives the Group the right to be wrong." Concept Three ensures the Right of Decision so a right decision may be made. The following checklist items come from the A.A. Service material SMF-91.

"CONCEPTS CHECKLIST"

"A service piece for home groups, districts, areas"

"While this checklist is intended as a starting point for discussion by groups, districts or areas, individual A.A. members may find it useful along with our co-founder Bill W.'s writings, a service sponsor if you have one and reflection on your own service experience..."¹⁴

- "Do we understand what is meant by the 'Right of Decision'?
- Do we grant it at all levels of service or do we 'instruct'?
- Do we trust our trusted servants G.S.R., D.C.M., area delegate, the Conference itself?" ¹⁵

Before recovery, my life was spiraling out of control, and each area just got worse and worse. I didn't have a job, and I didn't want one; I had no intimate relationships, and even my casual friends had stopped calling. Worse perhaps was that I had lost hope of my future ever getting better. It was exhilarating to witness the miracles taking place in their lives. Soon I believed there might be a miracle waiting for me, too. As I stuck around and worked the program, I found that I had begun to live again. Considering where I had come from, that was the miracle I had been waiting for.

"It may cause him to die a few years before his time."¹⁷


"We saw that we had to reconsider or die." ¹⁸

"Canonization of a Saint

"The first step is that the individual being considered for Sainthood has to have died.

"The second step is that people must consider that the particular deceased person 1) possessed what is known as "heroic virtue," 2) is now in heaven, and 3) should be recognized by the Church for the sake of the faithful here on earth.

"During this process, the testimony gathered by a Bishop is not only from those who were fans of the person. For instance, Christopher Hitchens (a famous critic of Mother Theresa and Christianity in general) was interviewed for the process for Saint Theresa of Calcutta. Once the bishop has compiled all this information the person may be known by the title of 'Servant of God.'


"After the bishop completes his investigation he sends his findings to the Congregation of the Causes of Saints. This group, located in Rome, begins further investigation and at the end of their investigation issues a statement that either attests to the 'heroic virtue' of the person, or denies it. If the person under consideration was also killed, this is the stage at which it is determined if they were killed, in fact, for their faith or for a different reason. If the person passes this stage they may be known as 'Venerable' and people may seek their intercession in prayer.

"From this stage forward miracles are required. In order to take the next step in the process a verifiable miracle must occur. This miracle must be investigated and proven to be impossible outside of divine explanation. These types of miracles are often medical, as in cured terminal diseases, but not always.

"Once a confirmed miracle has been attributed to this person's intercession, a ceremony is held in which the person is proclaimed to be a "Blessed." This is the final stage before being officially declared a Saint.

"The final requirement is one more confirmed miracle. The requirements for this miracle are the same as the first miracle and once the miracle has been confirmed the person may be named a Saint, which usually happens in a ceremony involving Mass at the Vatican."²⁴

St. Matthias the Apostle; Patron Saint of Alcoholics.



"Why is St. Matthias the Patron Saint of Alcoholics?

"Based on his experiences with the Lord, he was able to abstain from legitimate pleasures in order to control the lower passions. Subsequently, he became one of the patron saints for alcoholics. He was martyred in Jerusalem, stoned to death."²⁵

"Saint Matthias the Apostle, Patron Saint of Alcoholics


"St. Matthias was one of Jesus' followers from the beginning of His ministry. After the Ascension, Peter directed the 120 disciples assembled in the upper room to choose a replacement for Judas, so there could again be twelve apostles. Matthias and Barsabbas were proposed, and the lot fell to Matthias. He went on to preach the Gospel in Judea, Cappadocia, Egypt, and Ethiopia, insisting on the need to mortify the desires of the flesh in order to experience the peace and joy of the Spirit. For that reason Saint Matthias is the patron of all who struggle with the addiction of alcoholism. He was martyred in 80 AD." ²⁶

As Bill W. said in the Big Book, "To Christ I conceded the certainty of a great man, not too closely followed by those who claimed Him." ²⁷

There's no intention here to offend one who may not believe in Saints, or their (non) belief in God. We must look to the Big Book for this:

"Lack of power, that was our dilemma. We had to find a power by which we could live, and it had to be a Power greater than ourselves. Obviously. But where and how were we to find this Power? Well, that's exactly what this book is about. Its main object is to enable you to find a Power greater than yourself which will solve your problem. That means we have written a book which we believe to be spiritual as well as moral. And it means, of course, that we are going to talk about God."²⁸

The camel each day goes twice to his knees. He picks up his load with the greatest of ease. He walks through the day with his head held high. And stays for that day, completely dry.




We have initiated the process, through our Nominating Committee, to elect a new chair and the GSB commits to keeping you informed as we move forward.

General Service Conference Delegates Intergroup and Central Offices International General Services Offices

Date: February 15, 2023

Warm greetings – we hope that this letter finds you well. We are writing today to inform you of an upcoming price increase affecting our English, Spanish, and French books, booklets, and pamphlets. The new prices will go into effect on April 3, 2023, and generally reflect a 20% increase on books and a 30% increase on pamphlets (with rounding and some minor adjustments).

Some of you have indicated that you anticipated the need for an increase. For historical reference, the last price increases were made in 2014 (18.75%) and 2009 (33.3%). The decision to raise prices in 2023 resulted from prudent fiscal planning with the goal of longer-range stability. Alcoholics Anonymous is not immune from the changes that are impacting all businesses, and one of the greatest to us has been a notable drop in the margins associated with the sale of our literature. To be specific, prior to the SARS-CoV2 pandemic, the costs associated with the production, material, warehousing, and shipping of literature, collectively known as the cost of goods sold, hovered between 31-34% of sales. These same costs have fluctuated from 42-56% of sales in the last two years, resulting in a revenue loss that is greater than \$1.2 million each year. We do not expect this change in the cost of goods sold to resolve in our favor, and the impact is great when considering that the General Service Office is supported through both voluntary contributions and this revenue associated with the sale of literature. We continue to monitor and trim expenses where possible, being mindful of the immense significance of each 'nickel in the basket' sent to the General Service Board.

Because we appreciate that there may be high demand in ordering leading up to the increase, we will be taking steps to ensure that purchasing not be monopolized by large buyers during the transition. We will maintain the reduced shipping charges schedule that was adopted in 2022 and the mixed-title quantity discount schedule that was adopted at the close of 2022. The new pricelist, which can be found here will be reflected on the online store as the increase goes into effect. We anticipate issuing a revised and updated literature catalog in digital and print versions in the coming months.

Please help me set aside Everything I think I know about myself, my disease, These steps, and especially You; For an open mind and a new experience With myself, my disease, these steps and especially You. The prayer is based on several concepts referenced in the Big Book. Pg 42, paragraph 2: "It meant I would have to throw several lifelong conceptions out of the window" Page 46, paragraph 1: "We found that as soon as we were able to lay aside prejudice and express even a willingness to believe in a power greater than ourselves. We commenced to get results even though it was impossible for any of us fully define or comprehend that power which is God." Pg 47, paragraph 4: "Do not let any prejudice you may have against any spiritual terms deter you from honestly asking yourself what they mean to you." Pg 47, paragraph 4: "Besides a seeming inability to accept much on faith, we often found ourselves handicapped by obstinacy, sensitiveness, and unreasoning prejudice. "It finally beat us into a state of reasonableness. Sometimes this was a tedious process; we hope no one else will be prejudiced for as long as some of us were." Page 49, paragraph 2: "We who have traveled this dubious path, beg you to lay aside prejudice, even against organized religion." Page 58, paragraph 3: "Some of us have tried to hold on to our old ideas and the result was nil until we let go absolutely." The prayer does not appear in any literature approved by the AA General Service Conference. Individuals and groups are not required to only use literature approved by the conference. This litany is commonly attributed to Cardinal Rafael Merry del Val (1865-1930), Cardinal Secretary of State of the Holy See under Pope Pius X. C.S. Lewis attributed its composition to Merry del Val in a March 1948 letter to Don Giovanni Calabria. There is no way C.S. Lewis could be right as the Cardinal had died before the founding of A.A.,
