"How dark it is before the dawn!"⁴


"Realization dawns that he is but a small part of a great whole; that no personal sacrifice is too great for preservation of the Fellowship." ⁵

"We ask simply that throughout the day God place in us the best understanding of His will that we can have for that day, and that we be given the grace by which we may carry it out."⁶

"Some day he will be unable to imagine life either with alcohol or without it."⁷

"That feeling of uselessness and self-pity will disappear." ⁸

"It is joyous intimacy with friends and a feeling that life is good." ⁹

STEP ONE

"Admitted to ourselves that we powerless over alcohol, that our life had become unmanageable."¹⁰

We have seen HOW this works in others and our self on a daily basis. It works different for everyone provided WE have the Honesty, Openmindedness, and Willingness to be part of a new luxurious lifestyle. Oh, it is not the material riches we sometimes yearn for to acquire; it is "We had lacked the perspective to see that character-building and spiritual values had to come first, and that material satisfactions were not the purpose of living."¹¹

"Outlook upon material matters changes." ¹² This is a Promise of the Twelfth Step. One might ask, why are quotes from the Seventh and Twelfth Steps being brought up now? It is to convey experience, strength, and hope in the future for you, us, myself, others, another, and everybody with a desire to stop drinking.

Now let me tell you, I had no problem with the First Step. I ignored it at will, repeatedly for more years than anyone cares to remember whom thinks there has been progress made in my thoughts, actions, and deeds. Those that don't can have their own world, mine is a different set of circumstances, will, and behavior. "We rest quietly with the thoughts of someone who knows, so that we may experience and learn."¹³

And just who is that that knows? Our selves and God. Of course many others know of our escapades, sprees, and acting out demoralizing, humiliating debaucheries. Some way more than others. Working with victims of our past will only get us dwelling in the past with a hurt soul, not someone with the way out, other than the sage advice of "just quit drinking". That didn't work in that way for me, and more than likely, if you're reading this, not for you either.

So in our new found HOW; to totally, with certainty, ascertain our self, we turn to the One Who Has All Power. In the humility of looking at our self from a new perspective, from knowing consequences, some harsh, some never forgiven, we decide that the needed appraisal of our self and past times is due.

I work with a newcomer in this fashion: Make one

column and list all the things unmanageable in your life. It may be short or longish, but it is what it is. Now put a checkmark next to each of them that is caused by your drinking, maybe the excess of alcohol, maybe the abuse of alcohol.

An example drawn from my own experience.

\checkmark	I was tardy, or missed work.
\checkmark	Missed bill payments.
\checkmark	Had a mean and nasty mouth at times.
\checkmark	Forgot where I left last night's bottle.
\checkmark	Said if you'd leave me alone; there is no problem.
\checkmark	I can quit drinking whenever I want to.
\checkmark	Jail is a character builder take a look at me, I'm okay.
\checkmark	That DUI? I was in the wrong place at the wrong time.
\checkmark	The kids will be fine, I see them when I can.
\checkmark	Well, it's not my fault you don't drink.
\checkmark	I won't lose my friends over drinking.
\checkmark	A.A. won't work for me, I don't need it either.

The above table points out unmanageability in my life caused by my drinking, maybe the excess of alcohol, maybe the abuse of alcohol.

"We learned that we had to concede to our innermost selves that we were alcoholics. This is the first step in recovery. The delusion that we are like other people, or presently may be, has to be smashed." ¹⁴ "The idea that somehow, someday he will control and enjoy his drinking is the great obsession of every abnormal drinker."¹⁵

It does not say, 'that we can drink like other people..." Realistically, we can not. An admission of two things is needed at this point: the phenomena of craving, and the mental obsession.

First: we have no control over our intake; that is the rule, not the exception. Second: wasting precious time planning, excusing our next drink; but past consequences prove out our destructive obsession.

TRADITION ONE

"Our common welfare should come first: personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity." (Short Form), ¹⁷

"Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. A.A. must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward." (Long Form).¹⁸

Tradition One is in practice the essence of the excerpt from the song lyrics above introducing this Tradition. In what way you may ask?

Let's talk from the heart with love and peace. Remember "for those still suffering, in and out of the program". We've all heard that soliloquy.

Define Soliloquy: an act of speaking one's thoughts aloud when by oneself or regardless of any hearers, especially by a character in a play.

Hahaha. Remember the chapter in the Big Book that talks about the actor in the play? (From the last paragraph on page 60 to the end of page 62). Although we have all acted out in certain, most assuredly different ways, the root cause always came down to self-centeredness. And so we learned, and put into practice using God as our Director.

What does this have to do with common welfare and unity? Remember the saying, "God will never give you more than you can handle." Poof! There goes our self-centeredness. Bam! Here comes our heart, love, and peace for others. Paul tells us: "God is faithful, and He will not let you be tested beyond your strength but with your testing He will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it" (1 Corinthians 10:13)

For those non-believers of the Bible, here is an author's take on that, "I've heard well-meaning people say, "Yeah, what you're going through is hard, but God won't give you more than you can handle."

"The problem with that and Mother Theresa's famous quote—"I know God won't give me anything I can't handle. I just wish he didn't trust me so much" — is that it's not Scriptural. And anything meant to be a comfort becomes a confine when it isn't based on Scripture. What if Scripture actually says God intentionally gives us more than we can handle? ... So, in the face of overwhelming inadequacy, we set our hope on the One who gives us more than we can handle. We look to the One who handled it all, who has declared in his allsufficient strength, "It is finished.""¹⁹

We are the proof that our changed lifestyle, togetherness, common welfare, unity, and harmonious actions are not due to Scripture, but to our understanding of a Higher Power in our everyday lives. Through this truth of living, we have become what we were promised by simply avoiding the drink and following a few simple suggestions. "At some of these we balked".²⁰

So where does harmony and unity come together? Stated very clearly in the second Chapter of the Big Book,

"The tremendous fact for everyone of us is that we have discovered a common solution. We have a way out on which we can absolutely agree, and upon which we can join in brotherly and harmonious action."²¹

It takes very little to understand that "we" in the above quote signifies unity as expressed by "every one of us".

Furthermore, "agreement" and "harmonious action" is harmony in practice.

But then, this Fellowship and it suggested ideals were all new to me in thoughts, actions, and, deeds. But going into concerted efforts of *HOW* delivered me from that despair and connected me to people whom I could Fellow follow.

Still being prey, for longer than I care to mention, to the emotional hangover; "That is the emotional hangover, the direct result of yesterday's and sometimes today's excesses of negative emotion -- anger, fear, jealousy, and the like."²², I came to listen, listened to understand the Fellowship's suggestions, and saw by watching how it all works together - Common Welfare and Unity.

CONCEPT I

"Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship."²³

The A.A. structure is to ensure direction taken by the group conscience of the fellowship is not the demands of a few.

"Groups elect GSR's (General Service Representatives) which attend District meetings. The GSR's in a District elect a DCM (District Committee Member) to lead the District meetings and to represent the District at meetings of the Area Committees. Meetings of GSR's in an Area are called Assemblies. Area Assemblies send delegates to the AA-wide General Service Conferences that are held every two years. The General Service Conference determines matters of AA policy, and the General Service Board operates the day-to-day business.

"The principle behind the first concept is that we dedicate our sober lives to serving the group conscience." ²⁵



The Wisdom of the Rooms

November 6, 2023

Quote of the Week "The key to my serenity today is directly linked to my ability to stay in the moment—to be in the present."

Before sobriety, I was rarely able to stay in the moment and instead spent most of my energy dwelling on other times. I was either thinking about the past and regretting what I did or didn't do or obsessing about the future and about what will or won't happen. The past and the future both filled me with anxiety, so I filled the present with as much alcohol as I could. After a while, my present became intolerable as well, and I admitted that my life had become unmanageable.

In recovery, I learned the true wisdom in this quote. My sponsor told me that the reason the past and future filled me with anxiety is that, when I go there, I go there alone, without God. God only exists in the present, he said, and that is the only place I can find true peace and serenity. And the way to be content with the present is to work the Steps, clear away the wreckage of our past, and develop an ongoing relationship with our Higher Power.

It took a lot of work to achieve recovery in the program, but the result has been life-changing. Through the Twelve Steps, I am able to live in the present and in the presence of my Higher Power. But alcoholism is a tricky disease, and it still tries to lead me into the dark past or an uncertain future. If I go there, I find myself again alone. My solution is to get back to "where my feet are"—to the present. Once I come back to the now, I come back to God, and my ability to be serene returns.

"When I am disturbed, it is because I find some person, place, thing or situation -- some fact of my life -unacceptable to me, and I can find no serenity until I accept that person, place, thing or situation as being exactly the way it is supposed to be at this moment."

Amen." We have then completed *Step Seven*.

"Too much of my life has been spent in dwelling upon the faults of others. This is a most subtle and perverse form of self-satisfaction, which permits us to remain comfortably unaware of our own defects. Too often we are heard to say, `If it weren't for him (or her), how happy I'd be!'"

Our very first problem is to accept our present circumstances as they are, ourselves as we are, and the people about us as they are. This is to adopt a realistic humility without which no genuine advance can even begin. Again and again, we shall need to return to that unflattering point of departure. This is an exercise in acceptance that we can profitably practice every day of our lives. Provided we strenuously avoid turning these realistic surveys of the facts of life into unrealistic alibis for apathy of defeatism, they can be sure foundation upon which increased emotional health and therefore spiritual progress can be built.



TERM OF OFFICE

DCMs serve a term of two years. Alternate DCMs also serve two years. In many areas DCM terms coincide with those of the "panel" covering the area delegate's term of service. (See Glossary for a definition of "Panel.")

DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

Every district is different, but the following are relatively common service activities undertaken by DCMs:

1. Regularly hold district meetings. DCMs are asked to give reports to the GSRs on news, issues, proposals and future events from the area and G.S.O. It is also important for DCMs to keep the GSRs informed about Conference activities, perhaps even assisting the delegate in reporting the proceedings of the General Service Conference, either by organizing report-backs or delivering the reports to their districts in lieu of the delegate. GSRs are typically asked to report on what's happening in their groups, and DCMs can make sure that GSRs have what they need in order to assure good communication across the service structure. (See the section titled "Making Reports" in Chapter 1 for a list of publications that can be helpful to DCMs in making reports to the district.)

2. Regularly attend area assemblies. The number of assemblies during the year varies by area. All DCMs (and GSRs) from around the area are asked to attend. DCMs (and GSRs) are voting members of these assemblies. (See Chapter 3 for more information on the area and assemblies.)

3. Reach out to groups in the district that do not have GSRs. Some groups may have little or no history of electing GSRs. Some may have had active GSRs in the past, but no longer. The DCM is asked to open a line of communication with these groups. The purpose is not to badger them into electing GSRs, but to begin to connect them to A.A. as a whole.

4. Organize workshops and/or sharing sessions on service activities.

5. Bring Traditions problems to the attention of the delegate.

6. Help GSRs become acquainted with *The A.A. Service Manual/Twelve Concepts for World Service*. DCMs can also be helpful by introducing the GSRs to *Box 4-5-9* and service material from G.S.O., which includes workbooks and guidelines on an array of topics.

7. Alert the district's GSRs to new literature, service materials and technology applications from G.S.O. and Grapevine. This includes new books published by A.A. World Services and the Grapevine. The literature catalogs of the two corporations are an excellent resource. DCMs often hear about new literature before it appears in the catalog, and it can be helpful to alert GSRs on what's coming. The groups may have questions and comments on these. The DCM can help the GSRs address these while also passing them along to the area and the delegate.

8. Assist the delegate in obtaining group contact information for A.A. Regional Directories. These directories are used for A.A. purposes only. They include information on individual groups by city within each province or territory, with contact information on group contacts.

9. In many areas, DCMs attend area committee meetings in addition to area assemblies. The purpose and scheduling of these meetings varies by area. (For more information, see Chapter 4 of this manual on the area committee.)






