STEP FOUR

"Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves." 2

"Therefore, we started upon a personal inventory. This was Step Four. A business which takes no regular inventory usually goes broke. Taking a commercial inventory is a fact-finding and a factfacing process. It is an effort to discover the truth about the stock-in-trade. One object is to disclose damaged or unsalable goods, to get rid of them promptly and without regret. If the owner of the business is to be successful, he cannot fool himself about values." 3

The searching, fearless, moral, inventory is about past deeds that, good or bad. We do not want to be rid of valuable goods; rather discard those worthless.

That is the how with us; those who claim to only look at the bad in our past may need more mastery.

We need the fact-finding and fact-facing process. What is of good value? What is of bad value?

Now to the parameters, (a limit or boundary that defines the scope of a particular process or activity). 4

The Big Book gives suggestions to begin this quest.

Why are the following Four Parameters part of our inventory? Refer to the text of Alcoholic Anonymous to find the reasons.

- 1) "Resentment is the 'number one' offender. It destroys more alcoholics than anything else." ^{3 ibid}
- 2) Fear. "This short word somehow touches about every aspect of our lives. It was an evil and corroding thread; the fabric of our existence was shot through with it. Or set in motion trains of circumstances which brought us misfortune we felt we didn't deserve. But did not we, ourselves, set the ball rolling?" ⁵
- 3) Harm done to others. "We have listed the people we hurt by our conduct, and are willing to straighten out the past if we can."6
- 4) Sexual Conduct. "We reviewed our own conduct over the years past. Where had we been selfish, dishonest, or inconsiderate? Whom had we hurt? Did we unjustifiably arouse jealousy, suspicion or bitterness? Where were we at fault, what should we have done instead?" ⁷

TRADITION FOUR

"Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole." ⁸ (Short Form).

"With respect to its own affairs, each A.A. group should be responsible to no other authority than its own conscience. But when its plans concern the welfare of neighboring groups also, those groups ought to be consulted. And no group, regional committee, or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect A.A. as a whole without conferring with the trustees of the General Service Board. On such issues our common welfare is paramount." ⁹ (Long Form).

How does a group know how it affects others? Through the group conscience inventory with the Ultimate Authority; we are but only trusted servants.

The long form gives suggestions for group guidance when problematic for a group decision. At this crossroad; the 1st Tradition of 'common welfare' and 'unity' then becomes part of any decisions made.

- 1. Do I insist that there are only a few right ways of doing things in AA?
- 2. Does my group always consider the welfare of the rest of AA? Of nearby groups? Of Loners in Alaska? Of Internationalists miles from port? Of a group in Rome or El Salvador?
- 3. Do I put down other members' behavior when it is different from mine, or do I learn from it?
- 4. Do I always bear in mind that, to those outsiders who know I am in AA, I may to some extent represent our entire beloved Fellowship?
- 5. Am I willing to help a newcomer go to any lengths—his lengths, not mine—to stay sober?
- 6. Do I share my knowledge of AA tools with other members who may not have heard of them? ¹⁰

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CONCEPT IV

"At all responsible levels, we ought to maintain a traditional 'Right of Participation,' allowing a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge." ¹¹ (Short Form).

"Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional "Right of Participation," taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge." ¹² (Long Form).

"There is another good reason for 'participation,' and this has to do with our spiritual needs. All of us deeply desire to belong. We want an A.A. relation of brotherly partnership. It is our shining ideal that the 'spiritual corporation' of A.A. should never include any members who are regarded as 'second class.' Deep down, I think this is what we have been struggling to achieve in our world service structure. Here is perhaps the principal reason why we should continue to ensure 'participation' at every important level. Just as there are no second-class A.A.'s, neither should there be any second-class world service workers, either." ¹⁵ (Continued on p. 3).

"The 'Right of Participation' is therefore a corrective of ultimate authority because it mitigates its harshness or misuse. It also encourages us who serve A.A. to accept the necessary disciplines that our several tasks require. We can do this when we are sure that we belong, when the fact of our 'participation' assures the we truly are the 'trusted servants' described in Tradition Two." ^{15 ibid}



Quote of the Week

"Before you do something stupid, wait twenty-four hours..."

Restraint of pen and tongue was a foreign concept to me before I entered the program. Instead, I was impetuous and acted on feelings of jealousy, fear, anger, or hurt pride. Fueled by resentment, it was easy for me to justify my actions and ignore the repercussions and reactions of others. When I got into the rooms, I was at odds with most people and alienated even from myself. My life had become unmanageable.

When I began working the Steps, I learned to take the focus off what other people were doing to me and look at my own behavior instead. It was hard at first not reacting to the many perceived wrongs I felt people were doing to me, but when I finally learned to put a space between what I felt and how I reacted, my life began to dramatically improve.

Today, I've come to rely on the wisdom and the miracles that can happen in between my thoughts and my actions. Time after time, situations will automatically clear themselves up if I only wait, pray on them, and turn them over. I am much less likely to become excited or agitated, and I'm much less likely to make things worse if I can just pause before I react. Today, I've learned that before I do something stupid, I should wait at least twenty-four hours.

"Tradition 4: AA Group Autonomy and Responsibility

Group Freedom and Responsibility in the 12 Traditions of AA and Al-Anon

"Tradition 4 of the 12 traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous states that the freedom individual groups have carried with it the admonition to protect the fellowship as a whole. This means that meeting formats can vary from group to group, but it also cautions against straying too far from the usual program.

"'Tradition 4: Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole.'

"Tradition 4 Grants AA Group Freedom With Responsibility to the Whole"

"Each 12-step group has complete freedom to decide for itself the program content of its meetings and the topics that will be discussed. The group can decide if the meeting will be open or closed and when and where the meeting will be held. Each group can decide to change its meeting format and has complete authority to spend its funds as needed.

"The group can also decide how it wishes to begin and end its meetings. Some groups close with a prayer, while others have a moment of silence. In all of these matters, each group has total freedom. It is entirely up to the membership of that individual group.

"But the second part of this tradition reminds each group that it has a responsibility also to the worldwide fellowship and other groups. By adhering to the traditions and principals of its program, each group can assure that it will not stray too far away from the program's basic tenets.

"Limits to Freedom Granted By the Fourth Tradition"

"The autonomy provided in Tradition 4 does not mean an individual group has the authority to re-word the 12 steps or traditions or to create its own literature. Nor should groups introduce, discuss, or sell outside literature at their meeting places.

"Other than that, groups have complete freedom to design their programs to the needs of their members, which can result in a wide variety of formats.

"Many a meeting has gotten away from the look and feel of its primary purpose by using non-conference-approved literature, showing videos of popular self-help speakers, or allowing treatment professionals to speak at open meetings on the latest therapy techniques.

"There is a saying that there is no right or wrong way to hold a meeting, but the group can cease carrying the message if it strays too far from its traditions and concepts.

"How Group Autonomy Creates Different Environments"

"One AA member described what it was like when encountering groups that did things differently. He says that when he first came into AA, he learned how it went in his little group, and as he went to other groups in neighboring towns, he would think, "They don't do their meetings right," simply because they weren't the same as the first group he went to.

"Today these little things that used to bother him make him realize that they're what makes all these groups unique and different. He looks forward to the different meetings now because they're unique in their own rights. As long as the guidelines of the program are followed and the basic message is there for everyone, the autonomy of each group is one more example of why Alcoholics Anonymous works."

"I was surprised to discover that Concept IV is about equality, humility and inclusion: Voting members include not only delegates, but also the trustees, and the directors and staff members of A.A. World Services (i.e., G.S.O.) and the A.A. Grapevine.

"The boards of these two operating entities include as voting members not only trustees, but also non-trustee directors and paid administrators and staff members. New trustees on the General Service Board and new directors of the A.A.W.S. and Grapevine boards are sometimes surprised to see paid executives, staff members and outside accountants attending the board meetings. They are invited because of A.A.'s 'Right of Participation.'

"All of us desire to belong


"Bill warns against the possibility of new delegates or trustees trying to 'weaken, modify or toss out' the Right of Participation. He cites arguments by delegates to take away the trustees', directors' and staff members' vote at the Conference. 'Certainly,' he says, 'our trustees and service workers are not less conscientious, experienced and wise than the delegates. It is vital,' he continues, 'to preserve the traditional 'Right of Participation,' in the face of every tendency to whittle it down.'





- Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.
- An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.
- 7. Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.
- Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.
- A.A., as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.
- Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.
- Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films.
- Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.
